Foreword

A key aspect of a successful project proposal is to demonstrate that it sets the basis for and exploits synergies and complementarities with other relevant policies, strategies and/or initiatives. In the context of Interreg NEXT MED Programme, this capacity to achieve synergies should be substantiated in the project proposal at two levels:

- at *strategic* level, through consistency with the main strategies and policies as listed in the <u>Interreg NEXT MED Programme Document</u>;
- at *operational* level, through the actual use of existing and scale-up of results developed by other relevant projects.

This document is intended to provide orientations on securing synergies at **strategic level**. The operational level is left to the capacity of each project to find and demonstrate how it intends to build on, make use of and further develop specific results and outputs achieved by other projects, including funded by the European Union or other donors, in the Mediterranean area and beyond. Due to the significant number of projects having potential synergies in the different fields of intervention addressed by Interreg NEXT MED Programme, the identification of relevant results and outputs to be enhanced is at the discretion of the applicant.

Indeed, this document focuses on synergies and complementarities at strategic level, in view to supporting applicants with useful background information to demonstrate how projects could contribute to the main strategies and policies considered relevant for the implementation of Interreg NEXT MED. When reading this document, it is important to keep in mind that the projects must be able to go well beyond simply mentioning the most coherent and relevant policies or initiatives with respect to the themes addressed by the project itself. Applicants should be able to describe and elaborate on the specific contribution that the proposed project is able to provide to the overall goals, specific aims of the policy, strategy or initiative referred to, consistently with the Priority and Specific Objective of Interreg NEXT MED Programme chosen for the project. Ideally, applicants should highlight how the implementation of the project will contribute to achieving the commitments of the concerned policy, strategy or initiative.

The importance of 'Synergies and complementarities', both at strategic and operational levels, is reflected in the evaluation grid for project assessment with a dedicated award criterion: out of a maximum of 100 points to be scored for the whole project assessment, 8 are specifically dedicated to evaluating the way proposals build on and are likely to exploit synergies and complementarities. Indeed, applicants should pay maximum attention to the issue of 'Synergies and complementarities' when developing and implementing the project: this will maximise the impact of the project and place into a broader context.

Introduction: Seeking synergies and complementarities at strategic level

Among the most significant lessons learned from the two previous cooperation exercises under ENPI (2007-2013) and ENI (2014-2020) CBC Med programmes, the need to develop synergies





and coordination with policies, strategies, initiatives and other programmes implemented across the cooperation area **turned out to be a key element to avoid double funding, maximise EU funding and increase impact**. As highlighted in Regulation (EU) 2021/1060 (Common Provisions Regulation), "in order to optimise the added value from investments funded wholly or in part through the budget of the [European] Union, synergies should be sought in particular between the Funds and other relevant instruments."

Opportunities for synergies and complementarities between different policies, strategies and initiatives relevant to scope and thematic objectives of Interreg NEXT MED must be identified and promoted to achieve greater impact, added value and more integrated interventions, with a view to achieve enhanced cooperation across the Mediterranean. For this purpose, it is necessary avoiding as far as possible the duplication of activities between the various programmes and initiatives funded by the EU in the Mediterranean area, implementing sustainable interventions, sharing and enhancing knowledge produced, as well as defining coordination mechanisms and synergies.

The **first level of synergies** and the more natural one for the Interreg NEXT MED Programme is the coordination with **other Interreg programmes** operating in the Mediterranean region (including for instance Interreg Euro-MED, Italy-France Maritime, Europe, SUDOE, Italy-Tunisia, Greece-Italy, Italy-Malta, etc.). It is quite obvious that these Interreg programmes should be implemented in harmony taking advantage of the leverage power of collaboration in order to maximise impact and use of EU funds. In this sense, and to enhance long-term strategic and sustainable integration, Interreg NEXT Med, together with two other Interreg Programmes, namely Euro-MED and Italy-France Maritime, has established a multi-programme coordination mechanism: as a first major activity of this coordination mechanism, a pilot initiative on sustainable tourism has been carried out in view of identifying and enhancing the good practices achieved by the respective funded projects of the 3 programmes to support and develop sustainable tourism in the Mediterranean. The result of this initial coordination exercise is the 'Sustainable tourism toolkit', a collection of inspiring solutions implemented by EU-funded projects to address some of the key challenges faced by the tourism industry in the Mediterranean. The multi-programme mechanism, currently being extended to integrate new Interreg programmes, aims to develop further additional capitalization activities on topics which are common to the different Interreg programmes involved, including for instance the green transition, SMEs development or innovation processes.

The **second level of synergies** is the wider level represented by **global, EU or Mediterranean initiatives** such as the policies, strategies or initiatives adopted by organizations like the United Nations (UN), the European Union (EU) or the Union for the Mediterranean (UfM). Concerning the latest, it is worth mentioning that UfM and the ENI CBC Med Managing Authority (now Interreg NEXT MED) have signed a Memorandum of Understanding to strengthen partnership and cooperation in addressing shared challenges. Besides regular exchange of knowledge and joint activities (like the participation in respective events, working groups and conferences including United Nations Climate Change conference), this collaboration has allowed the labelling by the UfM of some projects funded under the Programme, a unanimous endorsement by senior officials of 43 Member States highlighting the strategic relevance of a project.





In addition, it also appears relevant to develop and boost complementarities and synergies with the actions and initiatives adopted by the EU to develop partnerships and cooperation with Southern Neighbourhood countries and financed through the Neighbourhood, Development and International Cooperation Instrument (NDICI).

The **third level of synergies** concerns the coordination of Interreg NEXT MED with national-wide policies and initiatives implemented in the participating countries, and, also particularly relevant in the case of European Territorial Cooperation programmes, the complementarities with the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF) and Cohesion Fund regional and national programmes, as well as to the interventions planned under the respective National Recovery and Resilience Plans (NRRP).

This document intends to provide applicants with a non-exhaustive collection of the main policies, strategies and initiatives mentioned in the <u>Interreg NEXT MED Programme</u>, in view of enhancing the potential to exploit and contribute through the development of actual synergies and complementarities. This document also contains information on the consistence with the 'Horizontal principles' set out under the Interreg NEXT MED which are fully part of the project evaluation criteria.





Horizontal principles

All projects, including their objectives, results, outputs, activities and the definition of target groups/final beneficiaries, must be designed and implemented in accordance with and respectful of the horizontal principles set out in article 9 of the Common Provisions Regulation and in the Interreg NEXT MED Programme, in line with the partner countries' national laws and regulations.

Consistence with the horizontal principles listed below will be assessed during the evaluation process through a dedicated criterion.

Principle	Description
Respect of fundamental rights	In the implementation of the EU projects the respect for fundamental rights and compliance with the <u>Charter of Fundamental Rights of the European Union</u> shall be ensured. Obligations set out in the <u>United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child</u> shall also be respected.
Promotion of gender equality	It must be ensured that the equality between men and women, gender mainstreaming and the integration of a gender perspective are taken into account and promoted throughout the preparation, implementation, monitoring, reporting and evaluation of projects.
Prevention of discrimination including accessibility for people with disabilities	During the preparation, implementation, monitoring, reporting and evaluation of projects, the appropriate steps to prevent any discrimination based on gender, racial or ethnic origin, religion or belief, disability (consistently with the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities), age or sexual orientation, shall be taken into account. Accessibility for persons with disabilities shall be taken into account throughout the preparation and implementation of projects.
Promotion of sustainable development	Projects shall be pursued in line with the objective of promoting sustainable development as set out in Article 11 of the <u>Treaty on European Union</u> (TFEU), taking into account the UN Sustainable Development Goals, the <u>Paris Agreement</u> adopted under the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change and the "do no significant harm" principle.
Compliance with the "do no significant harm" principle (where applicable)	Taking into account the life cycle of the products and services provided by an economic activity, including evidence from existing life-cycle assessments, that economic activity shall be considered to significantly harm: (a) climate change mitigation, where that activity leads to significant greenhouse gas emissions;





	(b) climate change adaptation, where that activity leads to an increased adverse impact of the current climate and the expected future climate, on the activity itself or on people, nature or assets;
	(c) the sustainable use and protection of water and marine resources, where that activity is detrimental:
	(i)to the good status or the good ecological potential of bodies of water, including surface water and groundwater; or
	(ii)to the good environmental status of marine waters;
	(d) the circular economy, including waste prevention and recycling, where:
	(i) that activity leads to significant inefficiencies in the use of materials or in the direct or indirect use of natural resources such as non-renewable energy sources, raw materials, water and land at one or more stages of the life cycle of products, including in terms of durability, reparability, upgradability, reusability or recyclability of products;
	(ii) that activity leads to a significant increase in the generation, incineration or disposal of waste, with the exception of the incineration of non-recyclable hazardous waste; or
	(iii) the long-term disposal of waste may cause significant and long-term harm to the environment;
	(e) pollution prevention and control, where that activity leads to a significant increase in the emissions of pollutants into air, water or land, as compared with the situation before the activity started; or
	(f) the protection and restoration of biodiversity and ecosystems, where that activity is:
	(i) significantly detrimental to the good condition and resilience of ecosystems; or
	(ii) detrimental to the conservation status of habitats and species, including those of Union interest.
	2. When assessing an economic activity against the criteria set out in paragraph 1, both the environmental impact of the activity itself and the environmental impact of the products and services provided by that activity throughout their life cycle shall be taken into account, in particular by considering the production, use and end of life of those products and services.

It also seeks to strengthen universal peace in larger freedom. It recognises that eradicating poverty in all its forms and dimensions, including extreme poverty, is the greatest global challenge and an indispensable requirement for sustainable development. All countries and all stakeholders, acting in collaborative partnership, will implement this plan. It aims to free the human race from the tyranny of poverty and to heal and secure the planet and to take the bold and transformative steps which are urgently needed to shift the world onto a sustainable and resilient path. The 17 Sustainable Development Goals and 169 targets demonstrate the scale and ambition of this new universal Agenda. They seek to realize the human rights of all and to achieve gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls. They are integrated, indivisible and balance the three dimensions of sustainable development: the economic, social and environmental.

EU Green Deal	Description: Climate change is the biggest challenge of our times, and it is an opportunity to build a new economic model. The European Green Deal sets the blueprint for this transformational change. All 27 EU Member States committed to turning the EU into the first climate neutral continent by 2050. To get there, the European Commission has adopted a set of proposals to make the EU's climate, energy, transport and taxation policies fit for reducing net greenhouse gas emissions by at least 55% by 2030, compared to 1990 levels. This unprecedented reversal is being further exacerbated by rising inflation and the impacts of the war in Ukraine. It is estimated that these combined crises will lead to an additional 75 million–95 million people living in extreme poverty in 2022, compared with pre-pandemic projections.
